
Not for the faint of heart

Puzzlemaker commentary:

"Not for the faint of heart" was both an appropriate warning for the puzzle **and** a bonus clue for the first name.

The chain of answers from E to T to B to H was the most fun part of making the puzzle for me. Though at one point there was a much easier clue for "NIGHT AT THE MUSEUM BATTLE OF THE SMITHSONIAN" and then the clue for H was "actor in B movie" which would misdirected some to think "B-movie" instead of "B" as a reference. Even those who got the reference might have filled in "BEN STILLER" which has the same number of letters as "OWEN WILSON". Ultimately I thought the chain of clues would be more fun. And I didn't want to give 38 letters away *too* easily.

Sorry about "SNOWDROP"! That was the toughest clue to write, and even people very familiar with Watership Down generally didn't know this one. Yeah, it's a flower in Europe, and it's what the British called U.S. military police stationed in Britain during WWII. That wouldn't have made it much easier...

I think my favorite single clue was Q. I intentionally wanted most of you to assume I was referring to *Twilight*, when actually I was referring to a much more critically acclaimed vampire film from last year. Lina Leandersson, as a child actress in her first movie role, totally took the genre of the vampire movie to the next level. I think *Let the Right One In* may have been my favorite movie from last year; you can stream it on Netflix if you're curious. I should warn you, it's somewhat dark—more psychologically unnerving than scary.

"Decline with a rhyme" is another clue I liked a lot. For me, a good double crostic has several clues that you scratch your head and don't think you know, but after working backwards you can sometimes have an "aha!" moment without having to go look anything up on the internet.

Several of you struggled with clue Y. The misdirection was once again intentional. I don't think it was a bad clue. Maybe a bad*minton* clue. :)

I did try to make the puzzle challenging on purpose. It was actually a bit easier when we gave it to the "Supergrands," but one of them who solved in in a couple hours (without using the internet!) told me it was a little easier than crostics that used to appear in *The Orlando Sentinel*. So I rearranged some words and rewrote some clues in order to kick it up a notch. Judging by the number of people who did, in fact, solve it, I was happy with the harder puzzle.

Several of you have asked how long it took to make this, or how I even go about doing it. It's actually not too hard. This took the better part of a day (but then a few more hours of another day when I resolved to get "DARTHVADER" in there so I had to re-anagram about a third of the puzzle).
